Managing Streams for Future Generations

STREAM RESTORATION ALONG THE Conewago Creek-fly fishing only section

In 2017, we will once again connect with our Southern Partner Northern Virginia Chapter of Trout Unlimited working side by side placing rock on habitat projects in the fly stretch. Our partnership with NVTU started in 1982 when cows waded freely in the water and with siltation everywhere. The early restoration efforts partnered the chapters to enjoy our 35th year working together. The essence of what Trout Unlimited Chapters are all about-working together to protect and restore a great fishery.

WORKDAY PLANS for the chapter

July 10-13 remove existing falling stone from stream then make room for new decking for mudsill. **July 15** rebuild mudsill with 2x6x8 oak decking using bolts. Utilize stone on upper bank to backfill decking. **July 29** utilize backhoe to build low flow device using R6 riprap also backfill area of erosion. Any of these devices can be moved ahead of

PATU-NEWS

PATU requests chapter involvement in adopting wild trout streams. Yes, its official, so many hurdles even within our ranks that PATU has requested each chapter to select a stream that supports wild trout to eliminate the stocking of hatchery trout. The management committee thinks the stocking of hatchery trout over wild trout slows the bio mass of wild trout reproducing because of the competition within.

If this is the case, PATU is suggesting that each chapter adopt a stream to be removed from the PFBC stocking list and try to convince authorities to approve their request. If a chapter chooses to adopt a wild brook trout stream or a stocked Class A stream, so much better, but many Class B and C streams would also be worthy candidates for this initiative.
