March Guest Speaker: Terry Sipe, Sr.; Woodcarver & Painter

We are excited to host Terry Sipe Sr, as our guest speaker for the March chapter meeting.

Terry started wood carving in 1996. He has taken several wood carving classes at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum in St. Michaels, MD. He also took classes under the teaching of Rich Smoker from Selingsgrove, PA who is a member of the Wood Carvers Hall of fame. Terry has been a member of the National Fish Carvers Guild since 2006.

Terry has supported the Adams County Chapter of Trout Unlimited by donating a half dozen trout carvings to be sold at the annual banquets and auctions.

He promotes conservation by supporting catch and release by creating replicas of fish that have been photographed then released, allowing the fish to return to the wild; and yet the angler has a trophy hanging on the wall.

Recently he has tried his hand at painting fish using acrylic paint on artist paper. In his own words, Terry says, like most people with a creative streak he can be rather eccentric at times!

- Pennsylvania Ursids focuses on the black bear and will be held August 2-6, 2015 at Stone Valley Recreation Area in Huntingdon County

The Academy has graduated over 200 high achieving youth from 54 counties across the state as well as students from Ohio, West Virginia, Maryland and North Carolina. Academy youth have conducted 932 conservation education, communication, and service projects and engaged in over 4,000 contact hours with the public.

The Boom of Opening Day of Trout Season 2015 By: Dave Swope

The opening day of trout season begins on April 4th, Easter weekend, with the invitation of Spring to many of us. In Adams County alone, awaiting anxious angler's casts, there will be over 20,000 legal sized trout stocked in the eight approved trout streams by the PFBC. Adding to those numbers will be the volunteer efforts of the Adams County Trophy Trout Program, ready to commit themselves for the eighteenth year adding 1,800 torpedoes (as my editor friend interprets them).

The PFBC stocking program is supported strictly by revenues from both fishing license sales and Trout stamps. This independent agency's program is one of the largest in the nation, stocking over 3.7 million adult brook, brown, rainbow and palomino trout to be released in the state. A change coming from the 1st Trout Summit in 2002 has the agency gearing up this year for larger trout to be stocked in 2015, which will require reducing the allocations per rearing stations.

Trout season is the main locomotive that generates over 600 million in PA economy annually. Many businesses rely on opening day into May to carry their business through the year. Stream flow conditions are good and the Co-op trout are nice this year. Look forward to some good in-season stockings from the Co-ops and the PFBC.

Opening day of Trout season generates the "Spring Fling Traditions" of the camping season. Opening day will bring anglers and families to the campgrounds - with many memories of just enjoying a warm spring day, give a chance to separate us from the cabin fever syndrome and wear our hip boots. It is also a time to view God's creatures, his splendor, reflect on our good health, and to celebrate his many blessings of our great outdoor heritage; reflect on our freedoms, and relieve the stress of everyday living and looking for signs of better times ahead.

The many traditions, we associate with opening day are almost more important than fishing. For the writer, the preparation of equipment and memories with my family in the early seventies has long passed, but the relationship with "trout being so much more than just a fish" has enhanced many memories in which I still view and look forward to that opening day.

Thanks to all those volunteers who realize through their efforts, give all anglers the opportunity to enjoy opening day and of those Spring traditions.

Stocking Class A Streams - PATU's Action

The Pennsylvania Council of Trout Unlimited (PATU) has opposed the amended statement of policy for section 57.8a. Under this revised policy, the Executive Director will obtain the approval of the Commission without taking into account any factors of the coldwater resources. In its letter to John Arway at the PA Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) on December 9, 2014, PATU acknowledged the intent is not to allow stocking in all Class A streams; however, the current language leaves it open to any Class A streams. PATU has suggested the PFBC re-examine the policy to include criteria originally proposed to allow stocking of Class A streams if:

- Angler use meets or exceeds the 75th percentile (number of anglers/mile on opening day)
- The water had been stocked the year preceding the Class A designation

- The stream does not contain a wild brook trout population or the trout species to be stocked are not the same species as the primary component of the wild trout population
- The stream was not identified as Class A prior to 2013
- After review of the above data, stocking could be approved by the Board of Commissioners and the Executive Director.

Although PATU is not in support of stocking over wild trout, the above conditions would provide guidance and a uniformed structure for the protection of our Class A wild trout streams into the future.

The letter was signed by Brian Wager, PATU President; Richard Soderberg, Co-Chair Trout Management Committee; and Ken Undercoffer, Co-Chair Trout Management Committee.

We are excited this year to have the Gettysburg High School group, supervised by our Trout In the Classroom teacher Shawn Abma, participate. This will definitely speed up the process. This is an activity for any age to participate in! All materials for the cleanup will be provided. Hope to see you there.

Conewago Stream Clean Up

On March 20th at 9am, the chapter will meet at the Bowling Alley on RT 34. at the end of the fly stretch, to performed stream litter cleanup along the access points. By then, Spring will have sprung and the snow will be gone.

Adam McClain Recognized

At the February 2015 monthly meeting, our own Adam McClain received a PA House of Representatives citation presented by State Representative Moul in recognition of Adam's tremendous work and contributions, demonstrated by his receipt of the Coldwater Conservationist of the Year for 2014. In addition, Adam received a letter of recognition from the Adams County Commissioners, presented by Commissioner Jim Martin. In addition to all of Adam's other responsibilities, he is the Trout in the Classroom coordinator for Adams County. The program will increase to 10 schools in 2015-2016 school year; the highest number in the state! Great job Adam and we Thank You for all you do!

The ABC's of Fly Fishing

Do you have any tips you'd like to share with others? Please send them to amystum@comcast.net. Look for more hints each month.

When you first arrive at your fishing destination, take some time to observe your surroundings for any clues that will help you determine your fly selection. Look at cobwebs on bridges or along the stream for flies caught in them, watch for birds swooping across the creek

picking of flies that have hatched, and pick up a few rocks off the stream bottom for clues of insects that are ready to hatch. I even carry a small homemade insect net in the back pocket of my fishing vest. Fish the bubble line to find the perfect feeding station of a trout. The bubble trail is where the main current is, and any insect in the water will be swept into that same line of bubbles, and you can guess that the trout will be in that same line picking off helpless insects and your fake as well.

Thread: 6/0, 8/0, red (based on hook size)

Bead: Silver, Tungsten, sized to hook


Tail: Pheasant tail fibers, 3-6

Rib: Fine Silver wire

Abdomen: Wapsi Rainbow Dubbing (*light*)

Thorax: Wapsi Rainbow Dubbing (*dark*)

Wing Case: Pearl Tinsel or Holographic Mylar 1/64"
