- Lunch will be provided by the Chapter.
- All work will be related to previous habitat structure repairs. All tools hammers, drills, nails, etc. will be provided
- What you Need: Bring hip boots or sneakers, drinking water, bug spray, hats/ gloves, and sunscreen. For safety make sure all cuts are covered with a bandage.

Background:

This year, the Northern Virginia and the Adams County Chapters of Trout Unlimited will celebrate their 33rd year in partnership of collaborative restoration project on the Conewago Creek, near Gettysburg. Our efforts will focus on stream restoration repairs of prior devices. When the chapters began the Conewago Creek restoration project in 1982, portions of the stream were choked off with silt, stream banks severely eroded, and cows waded freely in the stream. Roadways, farming, and housing all contributed to the Conewago's poor condition.

Over three decades of restoration work by the partners has resulted in stabilization of numerous eroded areas, safeguarding of mature trees, reduction of siltation sources, and habitat improvement measures including overhead cover for trout, placement of in-

stream boulders, along with log, stone and channel block deflectors, mud sills, and butterfly dams.

In 1987, the Conewago Creek was officially approved under the PFBC adopt-a-stream program, now called the CHIP Program (Cooperative Habitat Initiative Program), ACTU provided financial support through multi-year Operation Restore Grants in the 1980's.

It's early to start thinking about restoration work, but the time is right around the end of July to get "our feet in the stream" rolling rocks. All of our work will consist of making repairs on older habitat devices. At June's streamside short meeting, Saturday, August I was selected for restoration repairs on the Conewago Creek in the fly stretch. Meet at the pavilion along the FFO section at 7:30AM. The schedule is to work till noon, then enjoy lunch at the pavilion.

The Rivers Conservation Camp was held last month; the chapter financially supported one student this year and we will be anxiously waiting to hear back from his exposure to the outdoors. Some of the best in the State come to help educate the youths.

Thanks to Amy & Dean for attending the Southcentral Regional Meeting in Maryland last month; looking forward to hearing all about the meeting soon. Our partner from Cumberland Valley TU, Don Albright, gave a presentation on the Conococheague Creek Restoration Project at the regional meeting. The Pa. Fish and Boat Commission would like the chapter to present the "Jig" project at their annual board meeting in September in Harrisburg. ABC's of Fly Fishing

Learn to make single and double Hauls for added distance and wind resistance. It is a perfectly timed tug on the line with your line hand during the cast (not the pause at the end of either your back cast or forward cast). It will help in windy condi-

tions and can sometimes save an otherwise bad cast.

A bad cast should be fished out. Meaning, if your cast doesn't go where you planned, don't immediately pick

up the cast and recast again. That will only alert nearby trout to your presence, probably spooking the fish into hiding and gone for the day. Instead, let the fly drift down stream of the trout (fish it out) and then make a new cast.

The Environment After the Fire

Since the fire at the fertilizer plant in Hanover area, a recent storm has loosened the "biological bio-mass debris" rapidly through the Conewago Watershed from Slagle Run. The Department of Environmental Protection has not seen any significant impacts to the Susquehanna River from the watershed's contamination and has witnessed no discoloration to the River Waters. The reports coming from the Pa. Fish and Boat Commission state the mortality rates are well over 10,000 fish and will monitor sample watershed areas to determine impacts on aquatic life. Until it all plays out, no one can determine the end results. Watershed eco-systems can respond in amazing fashions and are resilient. As long as the water quality recovers, the fish should recolonize from mending tributaries and upstream flows not affected by the contamination. This will help downstream, with a disaster of this magnitude. A lot of work needs done in order to protect our sensitive watersheds that the living aquatic life depends on them. The best tool is education, everyone is responsible to protect and conserve for future generations, and not just for our use....a Commonwealth principle. Look for regulatory reform coming from such a serious chemical fire that has major impacts on OUR environment.

Congratulations to Phil Bietsch - Winner of the Dr. Robert J Behnke Award

At the 2015 PA Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp Phil Bietsch, a DCNR State Forester, was honored with the Dr. Robert J Behnke award. Phil is known by many ACTU members and partners through his efforts which initiated the 2-year Conococheague Restoration Project. ACTU congratulations Phil on this well deserved honor.

About the award: The Dr. Robert J. Behnke Award is presented to a graduate of the Pennsylvania Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp or any other youth camp modeled after the Pennsylvania Camp, who has gone on to further the cause of coldwater conservation. The award has been established by the Pennsylvania Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp to honor Dr. Behnke for his years of volunteering his time and his talents in teaching at the Pennsylvania camp as well as his educating and mentoring thousands of students during his career as a professor of Fisheries Conservation and Wildlife Biology at Colorado State University. He is the author of more than 200 articles and papers, along with several books, regarding fish and fisheries and has served on numerous advisory boards for state and federal agencies. Bob began writing the quarterly column *About Trout* for *Trout* magazine in 1983. He lives in Fort Collins, Colorado with his wife Sally.

Big Spring Trip By: Richard Lewis

Fished Big Spring near Newville. PA three weeks ago on June 17th....but just now have found the time to post a trip report. I arrived stream side to view the aftermath of a 200/300 year? interval flood on or about June 9th. The Big Spring watershed received 7 inches of rain in a little over an hour and turned the stream into a raging torrent. In some areas I saw stream gravel inside the stream side home mailboxes! The stream was back within its banks the day I fished it.

After fishing for a while, we came across a manager from Environmental, John W. Gleim the Environmental Services engineering firm that installed all the stream improvement



structures on the Big Spring. He was amazed, as we were, that the storm did not take out a single structure....they all were still intact.

Nymphed using a size 18 shrimp with a size 18 San Juan worm dropper tied off the shrimp hook bend. Caught the world's smallest rainbow and then was able to sight fish another nice wild Big Spring Rainbow. This was the stretch where I was able to sight fish the trout....they were very spooky. Also caught a small Brookie......that of all things took both flies.



These Big spring trout are very smart/wily....I watched numerous takes and then "spit it out" rejects by trout that did not even cause a single twitch on my NZ strike indicator. Caught two fish when I was simply lifting the line for my next cast....had no indication
